The Raising

"The Raising" is an evocative sculpture that delves deep into the narrative of self-improvement and the quest for personal refinement.

Central to this piece are two cubes: one rugged and robust, symbolizing the raw, unrefined state of a person akin to a rough diamond; the other, a perfectly carved cube, represents the culmination of persistent work and self-betterment, illustrating what one can achieve through dedication and effort.

This artwork speaks to the transformative power of personal development.

The rough cube, with its textured surfaces and visible scars, stands as a testament to the inherent imperfections and challenges each individual faces.

In contrast, the pristine cube, held aloft by a solitary hand, symbolizes the ideal self — an emblem of what we aspire to become through self-discipline and perseverance.

The hand that elevates the perfect cube acts as a powerful symbol of one's personal ideals and goals. It represents the individual's own hand in shaping their destiny, illustrating the belief that through continuous effort and self-evaluation, anyone can refine their raw qualities into attributes of beauty and strength.

"The Raising" encourages viewers to see beyond their immediate imperfections and recognize the potential for beauty within themselves.

The FLAWS Collection

The "Flaws" collection poignantly showcases a series of sculptural pieces that delve into the multifaceted nature of human emotions and individuality.

Remarkably, all sculptures in this collection are derived from the same mold, yet each one uniquely depicts a different emotional state, from anguish and serenity to contemplation and despair.

This technique emphasizes the collection's underlying message: despite our common humanity, each person's experiences and reactions are uniquely their own.

The use of identical molds to produce variations in expression and texture serves as a metaphor for the human condition. The sculptures are marked by their raw textures and the presence of gold Kintsugi — the Japanese art of repairing broken pottery with gold — highlighting the beauty in imperfection and the value of embracing one's flaws.

This touch of gold not only restores the physical integrity of the sculptures but also adds a new layer of meaning, suggesting that there is worth and beauty in inperfection, healing and transformation.

Each piece in the "Flaws" collection is an exploration of how similar origins can lead to diverse trajectories. The different finishes and details on each face represent how individuals carry and display their emotional and psychological scars differently.

Through these sculptures, the artist communicates a powerful message of empathy and acceptance, urging viewers to recognize and appreciate the inherent beauty in every person's unique struggles and stories.

As viewers engage with each piece, they are encouraged to reflect on their own lives — their vulnerabilities, strengths, and the personal journeys that shape their identities.

The collection stands as a testament to the resilience of the human spirit, invoking a deeper understanding and acceptance of our own imperfections and those of others. It is a celebration of the unity within diversity, and a reminder that our flaws do not diminish our worth but are integral to our individuality and humanity.

Oraculum

The sculpture's deliberate posture and the discerning gaze it projects suggest a creature that is both alert and conscious of its surroundings, representing qualities of vigilance and keen observation. This artistic depiction elevates the spider, portraying it as a navigator through the complexities of existence, actively shaping its journey and crafting its own narrative.

The sculpture stands as a testament to the nuanced qualities that distinguish each being.

The addition of a face gives the sculpture a unique personality, transforming it from a simple creature into a character with its own distinct presence.

The sphere's reflective surface mirrors the viewer's own image back at them, engaging them in a visual dialogue with the artwork.

This interaction emphasizes the uniqueness of each observer's experience and perspective, as everyone will see a different reflection and potentially derive a different meaning from their encounter.










The Beginning

The Chess Set

From an early age, Colby has been on a quest to find his place in the world.

He sought to showcase his wit and strategic acumen through the game of chess, a passion he warmly associates with cherished memories of his late father.

In homage to his father's influence, Colby has channelled his lifelong skills and artistic brilliance into creating a monumental masterpiece.

This chess set is the arresting centrepiece in any space it graces.

It embodies Colby's life experiences, weaving themes of hierarchical power, strategy, beauty, strength, and vulnerability into its very fabric. The inspiration for this piece stems from a desire to encapsulate these complex traits in a game that mirrors the world and its intricate dynamics.

The board itself is framed by a brass border and sits atop a robust steel platform, underscoring the gravitas of the game it hosts. The lighter squares and pieces are crafted from pure brass, contrasting strikingly with the darker pieces and squares of steel. Weighing approximately 25 kilograms for the board alone, and about 50 kilograms when including the pieces, this set is designed not for travel but as a permanent testament to Colby's journey and artistry. It demands a dedicated space to be fully appreciated, making a bold statement in any setting.
